MR WILLIAMS' VALEDICTORY DESPATCH

- I attach a copy of Mr Williams' Valedictory Despatch finished just before his departure on leave. I have discussed it with Mr Ure and agreed that it should not be submitted or sent for printing at this stage.
 - 2. The main theme of the Despatch is unexceptional and correct for an Ambassador in Buenos Aires. It is to remind us that despite the emotions created by the Falklands crisis, Argentina remains important to us and that we should not lose sight of the need to work for an eventual normalisation of relations. There are however some phrases and passages in the Despatch which would not be well received at this particular moment, if it were given wide circulation on printing.
 - 3. More worrying are the suggestions in paragraph 9, and particularly in paragraph 10, that our policy on the Falklands, in the period up to the invasion, disregarded the advice and guidance which Mr Williams had given. There is of course truth in this to the extent that the general advice given by officials was not able to overcome the domestic/political constraints. But the way it is put in the Despatch is misleading and could cause misunderstanding.
 - 4. You may wish to consider how the Despatch should be handled but delay a decision on this until you have been able to have a word with Mr Williams on his return from leave.
 - 5. None of what I have said above does of course detract in any way from the very successful efforts which Mr Williams made during his term in Buenos Aires to built up our relations with Argentina. It is quite natural that he should feel personally disappointed at the way things have gone.
